

Welcome, Petersburg readers!


Children age 0-5 living in Petersburg are eligibile to receive one free book each month.



As of now, children aged 0-5 who live in Petersburg are eligible to enroll in Imagination Library RVA. This long-awaited expansion includes all Petersburg zip codes. Read in Your Native Language Your January 2025 reading tip



The ability to speak more than one language is a wonderful gift to give a child. One way to support emerging bilingual children is to read aloud in your native language. All the benefits of reading aloud happen, regardless of the language used. The next time you go to the library, try looking for bilingual picture books that present the story in both English and another language in the same book.

Remember: fluency in English is not a requirement for sharing stories together.

United Way of Greater Richmond & Petersburg (UWGRP) is a human services nonprofit organization whose mission is to mobilize the caring power of community and create opportunities for those in need. UWGRP has three primary focus areas, Healthy Community, Financial Security and Youth Opportunity. There are many ways to get involved with UWGRP and tons of volunteer opportunities.

Most recently, UWGRP was thrilled to partner with Read to Them for a corporate event where employees created 40 Literacy Kits focused on financial literacy. United Way distributes more than 2,000 Literacy Kits to local elementary schools and youth-serving organizations annually. They have also installed more than 25 Little Free Libraries across the Greater Richmond area, ensuring that youth have access to quality reading materials, improving the availability of these books and advancing literacy rates for school-aged children. UWGRP also manages the upkeep of these libraries, ensuring they are maintained and stocked with great books throughout the year! 
Is your reader eager to get their hands on more books? Visit your local library! Sign up for a library card to keep the reading momentum!


First, find your closest branch library with this handy map.

Make a Plan

As you read with your child, try creating a family reading plan. Start by asking your child what kind of books they would like to read. This could be books about a certain topic such as animals, space, sports, or transportation or even delve into other titles by an author your child admires. Aim for four titles... with room to grow! Making a plan allows you to not only flesh out your reading list, but to read on your own schedule, at your own pace.
